NCOP ASSESS THE STATUS OF PROJECTS!

Despite several interventions, Limpopo remains to be amongst the poorest provinces in the country, this was revealed by Limpopo Premier, Stanley Chupu Mathabatha, during the launch of the National Council of Provinces Provincial Week in Polokwane on 9 October 2017.



During his speech to welcome National Council of Provinces (NCOP) delegates who visited the province to embark on a week long programme, Premier Mathabatha said Limpopo is the second province after Western Cape with the lowest unemployment rate, but still the second poorest in the country after the Eastern Cape.

"The latest statistics figures indicate the state of dilemma for the province. Although we have the lowest unemployment rate in the country, we still need to reduce unemployment from 20.8% to 14% in the medium and long term," said Mathabatha.

The weeklong programme which was held under the Theme "Advancing our collective efforts to creating work opportunities for our people" was aimed at giving NCOP and Provincial Legislature delegates an opportunity to ensure the following:

- Engage with both National and Provincial Departments and other stakeholders to get a sense of challenges regarding poverty, unemployment and inequality.
- Undertake oversight visits to employment creation initiatives across the nine provinces, including short and long term project.
- Undertake oversight visits to labour-intensive programmes and large scale investment projects in electricity, rail, water and transport infrastructure.
- > Gets a broader understanding of the economic challenges facing provinces.

In Lephalale the delegation visited the Sefihlogo/Letlora road construction project. The road is a Public Private Partnership between Exxaro, Road Agency Limpopo and Lephalale Municipality.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE HOLDS PUBLIC EDUCATION ON LGBTI & EQUALITY COURT!!

As part of an awareness campaign, the Limpopo Department of Justice in Lephalale Regional office, Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Intersex Sector (LGBTI) together with the Equality Court Forum hosted a community session at Mokuruanyane Multi-purpose Centre in Lephalale on 18 October 2017.

Various stakeholders took the opportunity to present information to members of the public with the aim of:

- Raising awareness on human rights.
- Outlining the role of the Department of Justice and Constitutional Court, South African Human Rights Commission(SAHRC), Commission for Gender Equality, Legal Aid South Africa and other stakeholders in respect of LGBTI and Equality Courts
 - Provide a networking opportunity between various stakeholders and the public to ensure a more active and effective use of the Equality Courts to counter discrimination, racism and other form of intolerances.

The Department of Health's Peter Kolobe, took the opportunity to discuss with the public on issues of available health services and the state of HIV/AIDS in the area. He said like with other boarder and mining towns, Lephalale is experiencing serious challenges of HIV/AIDS.

According to Kolobe the Department is also channelling its focus to key population groups (Gays, Sex workers, Truck drivers etc.) to educate them on measures to curb the spread of the pandemic and the benefits of circumcision. Parents were encouraged to start having discussions with their children on issues relating to sex and STI's.

In closing Lephalale Municipality's Acting Manager in the Legal Division, Queen Mphahlele, said the Municipality ensures that in its mandate to uphold the human rights of residents within local communities, the provision of adequate services remains a priority. She furthermore said that all residents within the Municipal jurisdiction are treated equally and fairly with their inherent dignity despite their sexual orientation. "Lesbians, Gays, Bisexual and transgender intersexual people are human and deserve respect and support. The Municipality does not discriminate on the basis of one's sexual orientation, sex or gender".

OCTOBER SAFETY TIPS!!

The General duties of employees at work (section 14 of Occupational Health and Safety Act 85 of 1993) are as follows:

- Employees must take care of their own health and safety.
- They must never put other people in a dangerous position because of your actions.
- Employees must obey instructions from the supervisors and managers.
- The Supervisors and Managers should never ask employees to do something or give an instruction unless the employee will be safe.
- Employees must report anything that is not safe to their Supervisor or Manager immediately.
- If employees become injured or are involved in an incident where something is damaged they must report it immediately to the supervisor or manager (Near-miss incident must also be reported).
- If the employee can't report it immediately, he must report it before the end of the shift.

GLOBAL HAND WASHING

As part of the annual Global Hand Washing Day which is celebrated on 15 October 2017 Department of Water and Sanitation (DWS) and Lephalale Local Municipality Sewerage and sanitation unit visited Lephalale Primary School on the 25th of October 2017. The visit was aimed at encouraging and educating learners and their teachers about the importance of washing their hands properly with soap to reduce childhood mortality rates and other related diseases such as diarrhea.



Under the theme "our hands, our future" Lefuno Ramunenyiwa and Masipa Lekota from DWS demonstrated to the learners the proper hand washing techniques to remove or reduce infection causing germs.

"If you do not have a clean cloth or towel next to you, you should air dry your hands and never use your clothes because germs could be on the clothes that you are wearing" said Lekota.

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LLM, Sewerage and sanitation Technician Teddy Molewa explained to the learners that they must wash their hands all the time to avoid getting infection causing germs and diseases a such as diarrhea and cholera.

"You must wash your hands thoroughly all the time after visiting the toilet; before you eat or feed a child and also before handling food. Washing your hands with soap therefore provide the interruption between you and the germs and prevents disease causing germs to enter your body" said Molewa.

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, which is an annual campaign to increase awareness of the disease

2) Where breast cancer starts?

Breast cancers can start from different parts of the breast. Most breast cancers begin in the ducts that carry milk to the nipple (ductal cancers). Some start in the glands that make breast milk (lobular cancers). There are also other types of breast cancer that are less common.

A small number of cancers start in other tissues in the breast. These cancers are called sarcomas and lymphomas and are not really thought of as breast cancers.

1) What Is Cancer?

Breast cancer starts when cells in the breast begin to grow out of control. These cells usually form a tumor that can often be seen on an x-ray or felt as a lump. The tumor is malignant (cancer) if the cells can grow into (invade) surrounding tissues or spread (metastasize) to distant areas of the body. Breast cancer occurs almost entirely in women, but men can get breast cancer, too.

Cells in nearly any part of the body can become cancer and can spread to other areas. To learn more about cancer and how all cancers start and spread, see Cancer Basics.

3) Symptoms of breast cancer

The most common symptom of breast cancer is a new lump or mass. A painless, hard mass that has irregular edges is more likely to be cancer, but breast cancers can be tender, soft, or rounded. They can even be painful. For this reason, it is important to have any new breast mass, lump, or breast change checked by a health care professional experienced in diagnosing breast

diseases.

4) Other symptoms of breast cancer

Other possible symptoms of breast cancer include: Swelling of all or part of a breast (even if no distinct lump is felt) Skin irritation or dimpling (sometimes looking like an orange peel) Breast or nipple pain Nipple retraction (turning inward) Redness, scaliness, or thickening of the nipple or breast skin Nipple discharge (other than breast milk)
